

First Impressions Clothing Ministry Changes Lives

First Impressions Clothing Ministry, Inc. opened on October 5, 2011 in the Old Fellowship Hall of Dillard United Methodist Church in response to the high unemployment rate in Rabun County caused by the closing of several mills in the area. Our initial focus was to provide interview and work-ready clothing for job seekers but we soon realized that people who needed clothing for work also needed casual clothing and clothing for members of their family, so our mission expanded.

We were blessed in 2015 to be provided space in the North Georgia Food Bank Shopping Center to house our ministry. We are now located in a large space next to Family Dollar and the increased space has allowed us to greatly expand our children's clothing department.

Grants, received from the North Georgia Community Foundation and the Lake Rabun Foundation, provide funds for the free distribution of men and women's hygiene items including women's period products and men and women's incontinence products. We have a special partnership with A Place of Hope North Georgia to provide clothing for foster children, in particular those who arrive in their new foster homes with little in the way of personal belongings.

We welcome everyone to our store! Everything in our store is provided free of charge. Everyone who works with First Impressions is a volunteer and our clothing items come from the generous donations of our community. We are in need of additional volunteers in order to expand our hours. If you're interested in volunteering, please contact Karen Carroll, (813) 255-1088.

Our store is open Monday through Thursday from 11 am to 1 pm and Friday and Saturday from 9 am to 1 pm and we're located at 84 Plaza Way in Clayton, (706) 476-7939. If you have questions about our services, please contact Janine Bethel, (706) 490-1882.



The Foxfire Museum

EXPLORE YOUR HERITAGE: Foxfire's Summer Heritage Days

In June the Foxfire Museum and Mercantile will welcome visitors to the mountain for two days of reconnecting with the skills of our ancestors. 2024 is Foxfire's 50th anniversary and we're excited to welcome folks to the land.

If you've been up to Foxfire before, you know what a treasure the museum is. If you haven't, or if your last visit was more than a couple of years ago, you'll be happy that much has not—that's right, has not—changed. The once-flourishing apple orchard hosts more than 20 cabins, mostly reconstructed by students. Trillium and ferns grow along the museum paths as well as Lady Slippers, various mushrooms, wild grape and hemlock. A keen eye will spot the last apple tree from the old orchard, a remnant and reminder of a previous time.

Our Kids Village is a wonderful and welcome change! Consisting of 5

cabins (with more planned), it's become a destination for local schools and organizations. Also, nestled at the top of Black Rock Mountain is a beautiful new pavilion which comfortably seats over a hundred folks—a great spot to enjoy traditional music on a well-spent Friday or Saturday.

One of the most unique components of the Foxfire Museum is the geographic and geological beauty of the property. The museum trail is approximately .5 mile up and down the mountain, most of it through a 60-year-old forest canopy of Oak, Pine, Hickory and Poplar. Heritage Days takes full advantage of this beauty, taking visitors back 200 years as they traverse the museum mountain.

Beyond nature and the historic structures, Heritage Days features folks demonstrating farming and livestock techniques, blacksmithing and more. Smoke drifts from the Warwoman Cabin, as experts demonstrate the history of Appalachian cooking—replete with the aroma of cornbread, apple cobbler and beef stew cooking on the woodstove.

For folks who love museums, history and opportunities to be immersed in nature, Heritage Days promises a full schedule of fun events including hiking, trekking and other great opportunities to enjoy both our heritage, our history and beautiful Black Rock Mountain!

So whether you're a history buff, or looking for a day out with the kids, or a naturalist curious about mountain flora or ready for a great mountain hike, join us for: Heritage Days, June 7 and 8, at Foxfire Museum located at 98 Foxfire Lane, Mountain City GA. What **Storm Damage**Homeowners Insurance Covers

The winds are picking up and those clouds aren't looking friendly. This may be the time you start thinking about what your home insurance covers. To help in these unnerving moments, here are some of the common concerns homeowners have about what water and storm damage their home insurance may cover and what it may not.

Water damage can be devastating after a severe storm.



So, it's important to know what types of water damage your homeowners insurance policy may cover and the types it may not. It partly comes down to how the water got inside your house. Storm damage that is usually covered by homeowners insurance may include situations where the home is physically damaged by the storm, allowing rain water to enter. In some cases wind driven rain may be covered.

However, this often excludes losses caused by surface water. Surface water can include, but is not limited to flooding/flash flooding of creeks, rivers and lakes; or sources like waves, tides, and storm surges. In addition to the natural sources of surface water stated above, many homeowners policies also exclude unnatural or manmade surface water hazards.

Storm-related interior water damage coverage may depend on if it's *new* damage or if it's been going on for a while. Water damage that has accumulated over time may be excluded. Mental Health Help in Rabun County

It's ironic that Rosalynn Carter died last November of a mental health illness, dementia. She was a lifelong crusader for mental health. According to the Associated Press, healthcare experts have said her advocacy created a framework for much of the progress on mental illness in America, especially among children.

However, there is still a long way to go. One in five Americans has a mental illness in any given year but 90 of Georgia's 159 Counties have no psychiatrist, including Rabun.

The worse outcome of mental illness is death. Analyzing data from the Georgia Department of Public Health (GDPH) for 2018-2022 in Rabun County, the 5th most common cause of age-adjusted death is Alzheimer's Disease, a form of dementia, and the 10th most common cause is all other mental illness. For 2017-2022 in Rabun County, there were 21 suicides,

with 2/3rds or 4/5ths of the suicides by gun: an annual fraction higher than our Public Health District 2 or the State as a whole.

From GDPH data in the same 6-year period in Rabun County, there were 29 deaths and 224 emergency room and inpatient admissions because of drug overdose, another mental illness. Our community has been seeing increasing numbers of people struggling with drug abuse.



A national study last month found a 29% increase in average number of deaths from excessive alcohol use during the first 2-years of the COVID-19 pandemic compared with before the pandemic, with women having 35% increased excessive alcohol-related deaths (deaths fully caused by alcohol use, including binge drinking and alcohol-related chronic conditions). Our Public



Health District 2 for 2016 and 2017 (last 2 years of available data), ranked 3rd or 4th of the State's 18 Public Health Districts for percent of heavy drinkers (men drinking 15 or more drinks per week or women 8 or more drinks per week).

Our local Rabun County Health **Department** is helping our community by offering services to people in need of health or dental services. Additionally, nearest addiction treatment centers include the newly opened Avita Community Partners in downtown Clayton, Cornerstones Counseling Center in Cleveland, faith-based Victory House Addiction Recovery Center (for men) in Tallulah Falls, and Freedom Ministries Lighthouse in Lakemont. Our local Rabun County Health Department, located at 184 S Main Street in Clayton, can provide referrals or you can contact them directly.





What started as a yoga class turned into a blessed and bountiful life on Lake Rabun. Keith and Cynthia Jackson live on the big basin on Lake Rabun, just above Sinclair Cove. Keith's parents, Richard 'Dick' and Astrid, acquired the place in the late 1960s.

Living a Bountiful Life on the Lake

"It began when my mother attended a yoga retreat at The Lake Rabun Hotel with a well-to-do friend," Keith explains. "My mom talked her friend into purchasing a condemned cabin on the lake assuring her that my father and her two sons, who were all quite handy, could make it livable for them. An agreement was made and my family came up and worked on it during the weekends."

"Once their kids got older, my mom's friend and her husband lost interest in the place, so they offered it to us. Unfortunately, the bank told my dad he didn't make enough money to even afford the lease transfer fee. Remarkably, the owners graciously offered to act as 'the bank' so that my parents could purchase the place.

Eventually, Cynthia and I tore down the old cabin and, under my brother Neil's watchful eye, built a new home in 2020 and moved in shortly after."

Well before the Jackson family started their life on Lake Rabun, Keith and Cynthia started medical careers, which is how they met. "Cynthia attended the Medical College of Georgia School of Nursing," Keith says, "and I met her when I was in Medical school. She was the best surgical nurse on the floor. We married on October 2nd, 1982 in Decatur, GA at Holy Trinity Episcopal Church."

Cynthia attended the Georgia Baptist School of Nursing and Medical College of Georgia where she received her B.S. in Nursing. Fun day on Lake Rabun ▼

"She worked at Emory in the Surgical Intensive Care Unit and Interventional Radiology until I completed my degree and then primarily at Northside Hospital and St. Joseph's Hospital in Atlanta," Keith explains. "For decades she worked as an Oncology Infusion Nurse in the Northside outpatient center. She is currently working full-time as a Nurse Legal Consultant for an Atlanta law firm where they let her work remotely."

Keith attended Emory University, The Medical College of Georgia, with an internship/ residency at the Emory School of Medicine, and obtained a degree in Otolaryngology, Head and Neck Surgery. "I was on the medical staff of Northside Hospital Atlanta, St. Joseph's Hospital Atlanta, Scottish Rite Children's Hospital Atlanta, and North Fulton Hospital," Keith says. "Kyle grew up going to Lake Rabun with his grandparents and was the inspiration for us to buy a used MasterCraft 190 boat when he was 6 years old to teach him how to slalom ski."

Keith and Cynthia's youngest son, Jake, works in the furniture industry in High Point, North Carolina. "Jake is getting married this June to Mauren," and according to Keith, "Cynthia has *ordered* a granddaughter, ASAP!" Jake attended High Point University in North Carolina where he majored in business with a minor in furniture.

Another important member of the Jackson family is Keith's brother, Neil, who co-inherited the Lake Rabun property. Neil



currently lives in Norcross and works in Cobb County in electrical contracting. "We're hoping he'll decide to retire up here with us, as he is an indispensable handyman and fellow craftperson," Keith explains.

The Jackson family also includes Taz, a 16 year old Bengal cat. "The first time we brought him home as a kitten," Keith says, "he went up to our half mastiff, half Labrador and slapped him across the snout. Taz trained me to feed him and clean his box, but otherwise, I don't exist. Taz is bonded to Cynthia."

Their life on the lake extends well beyond the gorgeous landscape and the serenity of its waters. Keith and Cynthia regularly pursue a host of interests ranging from writing, artwork, woodworking and bird photography to traveling, tennis, cooking and gardening.



community' folks up," he continues. "We had no phone service or television. We would play cards, board games, sing, and tell jokes. Mainly we ate and ate and swam and swam and swam. Alley's Grocery was as far north as we travelled, although we rarely missed going to Ezzard's Farm during blueberry season."

In those early days, the Jackson family brought their own community to the lake so they had few connections with other people on the lake. "They had little money, no boat, and were only peripherally involved in the Lake Rabun Association," Keith says. "We, on the other hand, are all in on Lake Rabun-which has always been our happy place." ~





Heat Stroke

When it comes to travelling with pets, even on a mildly warm day, simply cracking a window, sunroof, or parking in the shade isn't enough. Dogs pant off their excessive heat, and the brain signals for them to find somewhere cool to lie down. When left in a car and unable to seek a cooler place, the windows heat the inside of the car as does the air generated by their panting. Some people leave the car running while they run inside. While this may seem like a good idea, consider what happens if the a/c malfunctions or the car shuts off. I recommend keeping these trips to an absolute minimum or avoid them all



together. Also keep in mind—if it's 90 degrees outside, it's 140 degrees inside the vehicle.

Heat acclimation, which is where the pet's body adjusts to the surrounding temperatures, takes approximately 60 days. Internal temperatures greater than 105.8 degrees can cause nervous system damage and internal temperatures greater than 109 degrees can cause irreversible brain damage. Retrievers and brachycephalic breeds are at the highest risks. Heat stroke carries a guarded prognosis with a mortality rate believed to be about 50%.

If you suspect an animal is suffering from heatstroke, mist with cool or room temperature water and place the pet in front of a fan, but do NOT use cold water. Drive your pet to the hospital with the air on or the windows rolled down. Do not place wet towels on the pet as this prevents proper evaporation. Also, keep in mind that cooling pets too quickly can be dangerous, so do not attempt to do this solely on your own. This type of emergency requires the expertise of experienced technicians and veterinarians.

Prevention is key to keeping your dog safe from hot temperatures. Always allow them to have access to water, consider a cooling vest or cooling towel which are specially designed to allow for evaporation, and bring a handheld fan. 
