

Congestive Heart Failure

Heart failure happens when your heart cannot do the work it needs to do. If it cannot pump the blood out, this usually means that the left side of your heart either is not strong enough to pump the blood out or cannot relax enough to let the blood in. If the blood backs up, it can cause problems like swelling in your body or shortness of breath, or dizziness, or chest pain.
